CONGREGATIONAL INPUT NEEDED ON SAFETY COMMITTEE IDEAS

The December 2008 issue of the Communicator carried a brief article about FCUCC's Safety Committee and its charge to recommend new policies and procedures to promote the safety of FCUCC's family and friends in our historic facility. The article stressed that the Committee was to be mindful of not compromising our fundamental nature as a welcoming congregation, extending hospitality to all who enter our doors.

In December 2008, the Safety Committee presented its recommendations to the Council, and the Council discussed these in depth on January 8, 2009. Some of the recommendations were very straight forward, involving simple, low cost improvements to doors and windows, and the Council accepted these after some discussion. The Safety Committee also presented other potential courses of action with the caveat that these specific actions should be brought to the congregation for thoughtful study and discussion, in keeping with our UCC tradition. Some examples are:

1. Securing the southeast doors to the sanctuary (facing the corner of Tejon and St. Vrain) a few minutes after the service begins, to promote undisturbed worship. A welcoming sign outside would direct latecomers to enter through the Atrium doors to the west.
2. Having a volunteer greeter in the Atrium during and between Sunday services to welcome congregants and assist parents needing access to our Sunday School classrooms during services.
3. Placing a volunteer greeter outside the church to assist members and guests on Sunday morning.

Please understand that the Council has no preconceived notions as to which if any of these more sensitive recommendations should be accepted. We need to know the feelings of the congregation. To that end, we have scheduled two "listening sessions" where Council members will be present to hear your thoughts and concerns. The sessions will occur as follows:

Sunday, February 8, 2009, 10:00 - 10:30 a.m. in the Library
Sunday, February 15, 2009, 12:00 - 12:30 p.m. in the Chapel

The Council hopes you will consider attending one of these sessions to help us discern a way ahead that balances our stewardship of the wellbeing of our FCUCC family and friends with our desire to be "...ever representative, not of any particular interests in the community but broadly of the city as a whole, including sympathetically in your fellowship all classes and conditions of the people, rich and poor, high and low, the learned and unlearned. Do not allow this church to become in anywise an exclusive and therefore unchristian society, but keep it always as inclusive of all persons as is the grace of God made manifest in Jesus Christ" (Farewell sermon of Reverend James Gregg, June 6, 1909).

Thanks in advance for your support and prayers as we work together for the good of FCUCC.

FOOTPRINTS OF THE FOUNDERS

In our December issue we introduced past member Professor James Hutchinson Kerr and described his colorful life. Lee Tatum, a current member of our church and a member and treasurer

of the Friends of Garden of the Gods, called and revealed an incredible modern story concerning Dr. Kerr.

Lee indicated that in 1878 Dr. Kerr had discovered a dinosaur skull in one of the ridges east of the red rocks in the Garden of the Gods. Dr. O.C. Marsh of Yale University obtained the skull and identified it as a *Camptosaurus* dinosaur. The skull was shipped to the Yale Museum in New Haven, Connecticut.

As the decades passed, knowledge of Dr. Kerr's discovery sunk into oblivion. In 1995, two individuals were researching and writing about exhibits for the new Garden of the Gods Visitor and Nature Center. This project brought them into contact with the paleontologist, Dr. Ken Carpenter, of the Denver Museum of Nature & Science. Dr. Carpenter remembered an 1891 article that mentioned Dr. Kerr's find.

This led to the transfer of Dr. Kerr's discovery from Yale to Denver. There Dr. Carpenter made a cast of the skull and he gave it to the City of Colorado Springs to exhibit in the Visitor and Nature Center of the Garden of the Gods. When Dr. Carpenter made the cast he reexamined the skull closely. In 2006, Dr. Carpenter and his associate discovered that the skull was not a *Camptosaurus*, but an entirely new species of dinosaur, the only known specimen of which in the world is Dr. Kerr's discovery. The new species was named *Theiophytalia Kerri*, meaning "belonging to the Garden of the Gods" for James H. Kerr. Dr. Kerr had a dinosaur named after him 128 years after he found its skull in the Garden of the Gods while a member of our church.

SOUL FEAST

Soul Feast is a discussion group of a dozen or so folks who read books together and discuss them. We do not have a single teacher or convener, so we enjoy varied leadership from within the group. Beginning now we are going to focus on the experience of contemplative prayer, and Wil Green will offer us some guidance in that process.

Contemplative Prayer is a form of prayer long practiced in monasteries. It does not focus on composing impressive prayers, so those of us who are not too fluent or comfortable with praying aloud need not feel reluctant. The emphasis is on **listening** for God's voice, not choosing words to say to God. The practice is sometimes called "praying the scriptures." It is a powerful technique for sensitizing us to become more spiritually guided people in this new year.

For those planning on participating in the workshop to be conducted by the Rev. Jane Vennard on Saturday, January 24th, our Thursday morning practices of this restful form of prayer can help us to prepare for that seminar, and afterward can provide a powerful refresher course to help us make this practice a powerful benefit in our hectic lives. Refreshments are served. We meet each Thursday morning at 9 a.m. in the chapel. Come join us for a few weeks and decide for yourself if knowing our folks a little better and engaging in this practice would alleviate stress and aid your growth journey!

WHY I BECAME A STEPHEN MINISTER AND FOUND I LOVED IT!

When I was ten years old, my aunt, who became the first nurse in the U.S. to run a new, large recovery room at Massachusetts General Hospital, asked me if I would like to see an operation. The hospital had glass domes over several operating rooms for the benefit of student doctors and nurses. I was dazzled and thrilled to be chosen and immediately said "yes." Plus, my aunt was one of the funniest people I had ever known and I loved spending time with her. Little did I know that she had set me on a 40 year-plus career as a professional nurse and a lifetime of service to others. She achieved this by her example more than by her words: she was tender and humorous with her patients, incredibly knowledgeable, efficient and accurate, and a strong advocate for what she believed was right for each patient no matter who questioned it. When she died in 2008, I lost one of my best supporters and friends.

It was thus natural for me eight years ago to be trained as a Stephen Minister at Grace Episcopal Church. And when I left Grace and searched for a new church, First Congregational became my new home in 2007. I was delighted to apply again to continue my work as a Stephen Minister. The work is like no other: it is a Christian journey alongside a fellow church member who needs a friend. I visit my care receiver almost every week for a year's commitment. We have shared so much together: her life as a homebound senior, her extended family, her love of movies and gardening and cooking, her advocacy for a greener world, her cheerfulness and humor, her liberal point of view, her abiding interest in

the life of our church and more. We have become good friends, who love and trust each other, have fun together and share the good and bad days, the worries about the world around us, as well as the joys of grandchildren and her darling cat.

It is the gift of friendship which has bound us together under the guidance of our Stephen Ministry leaders. We all work together to support our care receivers and listen to each others' concerns, all with strict confidentiality and respect for each other's gifts and style. In the process, we as a group have become friends for each other and have gained much respect for the Christian work being done and the natural love for others. The Stephen Ministry will always have my deepest respect and admiration, and I feel humbled to be a member.

A Movement Ministry of First Congregational Church

Shekhinah (shékhīnāh, shuh-kheeh-nah) is the Hebrew word for dwelling or settling of God's presence in the temple. When we move our bodies with prayerful intention we create a dwelling place for God's presence.

The mission of Shekhinah is to invite the members of First Congregational Church and the larger community to embody the healing love of God through movement.

Through dance, scripture, and prayer, we invite you to deepen in to an embodied relationship with God. We will be studying the Psalms this year. Childcare available at no cost.

Frequently Asked Questions

Do I have to be a church member to participate in the Offerings?

No. All are welcome.

What is the structure of the morning?

We begin in a circle with a scripture reading and prayer. Then we dance for 45 minutes. Finally, we close the circle by rereading the scripture and with prayer.

What do I wear and bring?

Dress comfortably. You may dance with or without your shoes.

What does it cost?

The Moving Word is an activity sponsored by Shekhinah which is a ministry of First Congregational Church. This activity is offered at no charge, and is supported by the church and your generous donations.

Do I need to have any dance experience prior to attending?

No. You are invited to come as you are dancing the integration of music, scripture, and your own rhythm.

Several years ago, I read this quote from Thomas Kane, author of *The Dancing Church*, and it read, "In Africa, to dance is to breathe. To dance is to be alive, to be in touch with the rhythm of the universe." I sometimes feel odd or out of place, having dance as my spiritual practice. It is uncommon as a spiritual practice in this culture, where we often view dance as performance driven. I hear from those around me, "Oh, I am not a dancer. I have two left feet." Or, "I am so awkward, I can't dance." What I loved about this quote from Kane, is that there is a place on this planet where dance is a natural expression of Life and of Love. There is a place where dance does not need to be practiced, made perfect, or even look good. It is simply and gorgeously an expression of who we are. When I traveled to other countries around the world, including to Kenya and South Africa, music and dance were embedded in the culture. And even more, they were embedded in worship. I loved it. I long for community that dances together. We invite you to come, and dance, with us.
