WELCOME

We at the First Congregational Church of Colorado Springs are available to assist in the planning of a Funeral (a service with a casket present) or Memorial Service (no casket present) for you or your loved one.

First Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, considers a Memorial Service / Funeral to be a service of worship within which people are given the opportunity to worship God as they cope with loss.

The Ministers of FCUCC create a service that is respectful of diverse beliefs yet grounded in the Christian tradition of our congregation. Services include hymns, the reading of scripture, words of remembering and prayer. We believe that these services are meant to aid in the healing process by offering words, images, and music of consolation and hope.

The information provided in this document will assist you in making decisions about a Memorial Service or Funeral Ceremony. We look forward to giving you the best possible guidance in planning your event.

POLICIES & PROCEDURES

Once a death has occurred, FCUCC uses the following procedures to work with the family to create a fitting Christian Memorial Service or Funeral:

First Step:

Upon the death of a family member, please notify the Lead Minister as soon as possible through the church staff.

Officiating Minister:

The called minister on staff is the officiant of any Memorial/Funeral service held at First Congregational Church. Guest preachers must be approved of by the Lead Minister. The officiant will meet with members of the family, to plan the service.

Memorial Service Coordinator:

The Memorial Service Coordinator coordinates all Funerals, Memorial Services, and receptions held in the church facility.

Music:

The officiant will assist in selecting the most appropriate and meaningful music for the service.

- The church strongly supports the use of live music over recorded music. If recorded music is used, it must be approved by the Minister.
- It is the church's policy that the church's Organist provides the music for all services in the Sanctuary or Chapel. If the family wishes to engage the services of another Organist, a bench fee may apply.
- If requested, vocalists or instrumentalists can be arranged by the Coordinator.

Flowers & Other Decorations:

The Memorial Service Coordinator will decorate the chancel area with delivered floral arrangements. Photographs and other meaningful memorabilia can be used in the service or reception area.

Order of Service, Guest Books & Ushers:

The order of service will be produced by our Minister. Guest books will be provided by the family or funeral home. The Memorial Service Coordinator will assist in coordinating guest book attendants and ushers.

Reception:

Receptions following a service can be held in the Founders' Room for an additional charge. The Memorial Service Coordinator will work with the family and the Reception Coordinator to arrange a reception. See the list of Fees.

Audio/Video:

A trained Audio/Visual Technician will provide appropriate audio support for the service. Video, including livestream recordings must be arranged with the Memorial Service Coordinator and additional fees will apply.

Payment of Fees:

The Church Office will provide an invoice to the family. The Memorial Service Coordinator will distribute the fees to service personnel on your behalf. Fees are expected to be paid one week in advance of the service.

PLANNING RESOURCES

How do I plan my own service?

Creating your own memorial service is a gift for your family. It can also be a healing and enriching experience for you.

Where do you start?

- What has your life been about?
- What scripture, poetry or readings reflect your faith system and belief?
- What music and hymns speak of your values?
- What experiences, stories would you like your family to share at your service?
- What comforting thoughts would you like to leave for your family and friends?

Meeting with a called minister on staff to plan your service ahead of time is helpful. Feel free to contact them.

What should I do to start planning the service for a loved one?

- Speak to your loved one about their service as being helpful to you. Ask some of the questions listed in the left column.
- Ask about favorite memories and times of life.
- If it is not possible to talk to them about the service, then take your time in reflecting and give yourself space before coming to the planning meeting.
- Gather up any items around the person's bed, letters recently written, ideas last expressed to help in your decision making.

Remember that the service is to be healing for those who are gathered in their memory. Talk with other members of the family and listen for scripture, hymns, and music suggestions.

When you come to meet with the minister and service coordinator they will have suggestions to aid you through the process. You don't have to feel pressured to have it all worked out ahead of time. Keep in mind that the planning meeting is a process and the service will change as you work together to create an experience that speaks to all those who loved the one you are honoring. Be assured that if you have not chosen scripture or music prior to the meeting that the minister will offer his or her expertise and support for selections.

Consider this process of creating a memorial service to be a time of healing for you as well.

Planning steps to take prior to death

It is helpful to have some information identified ahead of time. No two lives are alike and the process of closing out someone's life has many twists and turns. There are legal and personal decisions to be made.

Here are just a few suggestions to get you started.

- Identify funeral home to be used (talk to friends; get information from funeral homes; visit with the funeral home; ask for a list of costs and fees; don't be afraid to ask questions)
- Decide whether cremation is an option by talking with loved ones.
- Decide about burial (cemetery, at sea, eco-friendly) or other options.
- Arrange to make a living will and/or fill out Five Last Wishes (www.agingwithdignity.org)
- Begin to gather information to be used for the funeral/ memorial service as suggested above such as scripture, special music, soloists, photos, readings, poetry which can be used in the order of service.
- Most importantly, write down the results of your decisions and make sure the family knows where to find the information.
